- 1. Wall-mounted 43" LCD screens with speakers and central VGA plugins for sharing the screen
- 2. Large work table with eight chairs
- 3. Movable whiteboards
- 4. There are two Group Study Rooms in the Learning Commons and seven in the South Tower Bookstacks on floors 2 through 8 (2nd floor room does not have a wall-mounted LCD or whiteboard)
- 5. Group Study Rooms are reservable online<http://www.lib.ncsu.edu/studyrooms/getaroom.php for 2-hour blocks
- 6. Due to high demand, groups are limited to one reservation per day. Reservations can be made up to seven days in advance.



The Presentation Room is specifically designed for presenters. It is used frequently by students to practice their class presentations as well as actual class meetings. Since this room does not have computers the arrangement of the room can be configured to meet the needs of the group.

The IMC Presentation room features:

- > one instructor podium with CD drive, speakers,
- > data projector, and screen
- > TV/DVD setup capabilities
- > one whiteboard with markers and eraser
- > seating for up to 35 students


